Arizona's Code of Ethics

In Arizona, an ethics committee is established in the senate and an ethics committee is established in the house of representatives, each consisting of five members. Each ethics committee shall propose, and each house of the legislature shall adopt, not later than thirty days after the beginning of the first regular legislative session, a code of ethics and conflict of interest requirements as part of the rules of the respective house in the same manner as other rules are adopted.

Election Administrator Code of Conduct - All offices tasked with election duties are encouraged to adopt a code of conduct to be signed and acknowledged by all staff and vendors carrying out such duties, including poll workers, board workers, central counting location workers, and other staff who directly support election administration (e.g., clerical, secretarial, and IT personnel). An Election Administrator Code of Conduct should establish ethical standards of behavior and may contain provisions substantially similar to the Secretary of State's Arizona Election Official Code of Conduct. An Election Administrator Code of Conduct and all officers responsible for overseeing staff covered by such a code of conduct shall comply with <u>A.R.S. § 41-752</u>.
